

BIBLIOGRAPHY ON THE ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND OF THE LINEAR B TABLETS WITH SPECIAL REFERENCE TO IDEOGRAMS OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL INTEREST

Confronted with such a title, one may wonder what justification a bibliography of the sort can possibly have. Why not a «Study», a finished product, or nothing? In fact, even a finished product concerned with this subject might be judged superfluous at this stage. There have been a number of studies on the subject, and a new one is due to appear (cf. *BCH* 94, 1970, p. 301). Such studies have been either archaeological commentaries on the Linear B ideograms or a tablets/ideograms appendix to the treatment of an archaeological object or objects. Moreover, books which deal with the Mycenaean civilization and material culture often include a chapter on written sources. My intentions in handling the problem announced in the title were not to overlap with any of the above categories of studies by offering results and conclusions —I cannot see, for myself, that there is much new and worthwhile to add at the present state of our knowledge—, but to facilitate the interrelation of the two disciplines, Mycenaean philology and Mycenaean archaeology. This I have tried to do by compiling a bibliography of publications classified by classes of objects and general topics, as a quick means of cross-reference between the disciplines. However, this is still a list compiled by an archaeologist and addressed mainly to philologists, therefore it is hoped that the inevitable omissions in the other direction might be forgiven.

The bibliography is, of course, to a certain extent selective. Among the philological publications, I refer to those that seem to me relevant from an archaeological or general (i.e. not specifically linguistic) point of view. As regards the archaeological publications, I have included all relevant discussions of a given topic (or at least all those that I am aware of) and the most important publications of material. In vast subjects like «Pottery»

those publications have been selected that are particularly relevant to the Linear B tablets. Publications of material of recent find are also included, since they have not yet found their way to the general literature.

In the choice of topics other than those based on ideograms, the main guiding line has been the combination of the «material» aspect of the evidence and the relevance to the tablets. Thus, while there is no heading on Mycenaean religion, there is one on shrines and sanctuaries. Pictorial representations of the objects concerned are referred to mainly in cases where such representations both form a decisive part of our evidence and can compare with ideograms, e.g. chariots.

I have not been able to take into account publications which only became accessible to me after December 1971.

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5. CHESTS AND LARNAKES.

I believe that the ideogram *178 represents a chest; what is shown (cf. *BCH* 94, p. 306 fig. 17) would be the elevation of one of the small sides of a specimen with flat lid. The design on top then would not belong to the object but would have the function of specifying it further, «determining» it. I was thinking that in that case it would have to be a *ti*, when Mr J. Boardman suggested to me a more attractive alternative: that it could be an arrow indicating the contents of the chest: in which case *178 would mean: a chest containing arrows.

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A NOTE ON *245.

With the aid of the new, enlarged, photograph of *245 provided by J.-P. Olivier and F. Vandenabeele in *BCH* 94, p. 307 fig. 22, it is possible to identify this ideogram, which occurs in




FIG. 1: *245 in *KN Sf 4465*

Sf 4465, and which, thanks to the mention of *a-na-mo-ta* was known to be referred to the chariot, as the yoke with the rein-guides and the beginning of the shaft. The upper part could be understood as superimposed, whether vertically or not, and whether with a decorative function or not, an arrangement such as might

be reflected in some chariot ideograms, cf. *PoM* IV, p. 790 fig. 764. In fig. 1 can be seen my interpretation of the photograph in *BCH*.*

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
